2008 Wake Electric annual meeting a success!

Wake Electric and its members are facing a monumental challenge - climate change. Many scientists agree that greenhouse gases, including carbon dioxide, warm the Earth and are accumulating in the Earth's atmosphere as a result of human activities. However, there is still some uncertainty as to how greenhouse gases actually affect the Earth's climate. That's one of the messages Wake Electric's CEO Jim Mangum shared with members at Wake's recent annual meeting at Louisburg College Auditorium in Louisburg. Mangum explained

Louisburg. Mangum explained to members that new legislation calls for electric utilities to

implement technologies and utilize renewable energy sources in order to slow, stop and eventually reduce the level of greenhouse gases in the Earth's atmosphere.

"Wake Electric takes its role for responsible action very seriously," said Mangum.

There is no single solution to climate change, said Mangum, but there are technologies that, combined, can reduce greenhouse gas emissions to the benchmark 1990 level. These technologies, according to recent studies, are: energy efficiency, different sources of renewable energy, nuclear generation, advanced coal generation, carbon capture and storage, plug-in hybrid vehicles and distributed energy resources. As these technologies develop, we all have the opportunity to become more energy efficient, advised Mangum.

He suggested to members that they consider changing traditional incandescent light bulbs to compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs), upgrading appliances to newer, more energy efficient appliances, and

follow home improvement tips like adding insulation (additional tips are on Wake Electric's website at www.wemc.com). Members also learned that in 2007, \$50,000 was awarded to local teachers through Wake Electric's, Bright Ideas grant program, \$8,000 was given in scholarships, and another \$20,000 was granted in Classroom Technology Awards. Three members were elected to the cooperative's Board of Directors to serve three-year terms:


The Touchstone Energy Scholarship winners are:

Spring right-of-way clearing

Spring is upon us and once again Wake Electric is scheduling the distribution circuits and transmission lines that will be sprayed this year.

The use of herbicides to control the young trees and brush has been part of Wake Electric's annual right of way maintenance program since 1997.

Since we began using the herbicides in conjunction with bushhogging, the number of stems or young trees that have caused issues been greatly reduced.

Without the heavy infestation of young trees to shade the ground, we see a thicker growth of wild grasses and weeds that help shade the ground and make it harder for young trees to sprout.

This year Wake Electric will be spraying right of ways in portions of the following counties:

- Vance,
- Granville.
- Franklin,
- Wake,
- Nash,
- and Johnston

Wake will also work from the following substations:

- Kittrell,
- Tar River.
- Creedmoor,
- New Light,
- Franklinton.
- Wake Forest,
- 98 East.
- Walkers Crossroads,
- Lassiter,
- Emit
- and Hares.

Wake Electric uses only chemicals that are registered with the Environmental Protection Agency. All spray work is done by certified applicators. The herbicide solution is applied at low volume rates with backpack style equipment.
