You must be a residential electric customer with a valid account number to participate. Refrigerators and freezers turned in for recycling must be secondary units in working condition (cooling), 10-30 cubic feet, owned by you and picked up from the residential address listed on the billing account. The \$50 rebate will be mailed to you in the form of a check within 4-6 weeks after collection.

- **★** Must use these funds at a North Carolina college or university, community college, vocational or technical school
- \*Applicants can be a high school graduating senior or already enrolled full-time in a university, community college, vocational or technical school



Winners receive \$1,000 scholarship and all-expenses paid trip to D.C.


